

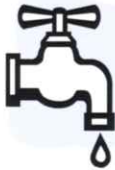
Davis EMERGENCY Checklist



Emergency Kit Checklist

Below is a checklist to assist you in building a preparedness kit. Water



- Store one gallon of water per person per day
- Keep at least a three day supply of water per person. Plan on two quarts of water for drinking and two quarts for each person in your household for food preparation and sanitation

Food



- Store at least a three-day supply of non-perishable food including: ready to eat canned meats, fruits and vegetables
- High energy food
- Special food for infants as needed
- Comfort or stress foods
- Staples (salt, sugar, pepper, spices, etc.)
- Powdered milk
- Coffee

Sanitary Supplies



- Toilet paper
- Soap, liquid detergent
- Feminine supplies
- Personal hygiene items
- Plastic garbage bags & ties
- Disinfectant
- Household chlorine bleach
- Plastic bucket with tight lid
- Toothpaste
- Shampoo
- Deodorant
- Razor
- Shovel
- Mirror

Clothing and Bedding



- Rain gear
- Work boots
- Blankets or sleeping bags
- Thermal underwear
- Sunglasses
- Hat
- Gloves
- Change of clothes
- Extra underwear/socks

First Aid Kit

Assemble a first aid kit for your home and one for each car including:

- First aid manual
- Bandages, various sizes
- Sterile dressings
- Conforming rolled gauze bandages
- Gauze pads, various sizes
- Germicidal pads, various sized
- Germicidal hand wipes or waterless alcohol-based hand sanitizer



- Medical grade non-latex gloves
- Anti-bacterial ointment
- Cold packs
- Scissors
- CPR breathing barrier, such as a face shield
- Thermometer
- Sunscreen
- Insect repellent
- Tweezers
- Safety pins

Medications



- Pain relievers
- Anti-diarrhea medications
- Antacid
- Laxative
- Vitamins
- Activated charcoal (use if advised by the Poison Control Center)

Tools and Supplies



- Battery-operated radio and extra batteries
- Flashlight and extra batteries
- Utility knife, non-electric can opener
- Fire extinguisher
- Pliers, tape/matches in a waterproof container, aluminum foil
- Compass
- Signal flare
- Needles and thread
- Plastic storage containers
- Maps
- Whistle
- Tent
- Paper and pens
- Cooking stove
- Shut-off wrench
- Plastic sheeting
- Duct tape
- Fire Extinguisher

Special Needs for Adults and Children



- Prescription medications
- Diapers
- Bottles
- Contact lenses and supplies
- Extra pair of glasses
- Walkers or canes
- Hearing aids

Pets



- Water
- Food/bowls/can opener
- Grooming tools
- Toys/bed
- Leash/harness
- Medications
- Vet and vaccination records
- Pictures of your pet
- Litter/litter tray
- First aid kit
- Carrier (large enough for the animal to turn around and lie down)
- Blankets/towels
- Paper towels/newspapers
- Garbage bags/bleach

Family Documents and Cash



- A waterproof, portable container to keep documents
- Copies of your will, insurance policies, contracts, deeds, stocks and bonds
- Passports, social security cards, medical records
- Bank and credit card

- account numbers
- Birth, marriage and death certificates
- Map of the area
- Credit cards
- Cash or traveler's checks
- Inventory of your house
- Keys
- Emergency contact list

Entertainment



- Games
- Portable music devices
- Books
- Cards
- Toy

Preparing for Emergencies: Make a Plan and Build a Kit

During a large scale disaster city and regional resources may be overwhelmed handling emergencies. You may need to take care of yourself and your family for several days. Plan to sustain yourself, your family and pets for three days. Create a family preparedness plan and put together an emergency kit (for home and for your car).

A family preparedness plan should include

- where to meet your family members if you are separated
- how to contact one another during an emergency
- the name of a friend or relative (preferably one who lives out of the area) to serve as central contact point

How to Deal with an Intersection when the Traffic Lights are Out



Pursuant to the California Vehicle Code, if the power goes out and traffic signals are not working, ALL intersections normally controlled by a traffic signal IMMEDIATELY become FOUR-WAY STOPS. ALWAYS stop at a darkened intersection, and then proceed with caution. Be extra alert since normal traffic patterns will be disrupted. Also, use extra caution when approaching railroad crossings.

Please be patient and courteous to ensure safe driving.
