**Chief's Update**

Chief Black prepared comparative UCR crime data charts which were distributed to CAB members and are attached.

The Police Department participated in Davis Neighbors Night Out and visited with various community groups during their parties. Chief Black appreciated the opportunities to talk with individuals. He is still hearing about people who don't feel a need to lock their doors or close their garages. There were 143 organized events this year.

**Round Table**

**African American Community** – Mel Lewis reported that the School Resource Officer has been connecting with students and they look at him as an individual instead of as a Cop. He also told about an incident that took place over the course of a couple of hours in the backyard of a co-worker. After some commotion, a suspect was apprehended. The resident felt a representative from the Police Department should have come to the door to explain what had happened.

**Beat 1** - Carla Pion reported that some students attended their Neighbor's Night Out event. She said her neighbors talked about crime and wondered where the sensationalism about a rise in crime is coming from. Statistics are not showing a rise from previous years. Carla asked about the Care Trak program. One child and one adult have been located since it began.

**Beat 3** - Diane McGee reported that Sergeant Tenedora and her beat copy attended their Neighbors Night Out event. Neighbors wanted to know what happened with the wild turkeys. She was able to explain about the relocation of 17 into Carson Valley, Nevada. There are more turkeys at Catalina and Anza now that may need to be relocated in the future.

**ASUCD** - Cory Bullis was introduced as the ASUCD representative for the 09-10 school year. He said he has not heard about the Neighborhood Night Out which resulted in discussion about better ways to get the word out to students. Ideas included flyers and emails through the apartment complexes, posters by the mailboxes, and asking the complex managers for help getting the information out. Cory said the students need to know how such an event would affect or benefit them.

**Islamic Community** – Hamza El-Nakhal attended an Oeste Neighborhood Association meeting. He expressed a need for breaking down barriers to make students feel welcomed—taking cookies, have an exchange, learn their names, and have conversations grow. Hamza also announced the Concilio Annual fundraiser on Saturday, October 17 at 5:30 p.m. Hamza said the Islamic Center Community Open House was good.

**Downtown Davis Business Association** - Janis Lott reported that no concerns have been expressed by DDBA and Chamber recently. They are anticipating the cold weather shelter starting up soon and recognize groups will be coming and going to the drop off/pick up location. Janis was pleased with the way people shared information about public safety issues during the Neighbors Night Out with Davis Manor Neighborhood Association.

**Beat 4** – Judi Adelman reported it to be quiet in South Davis. Although they put out fliers about Neighbors Night Out, extended it to include two streets, and have a lot of student housing in the area, there were no students in attendance.

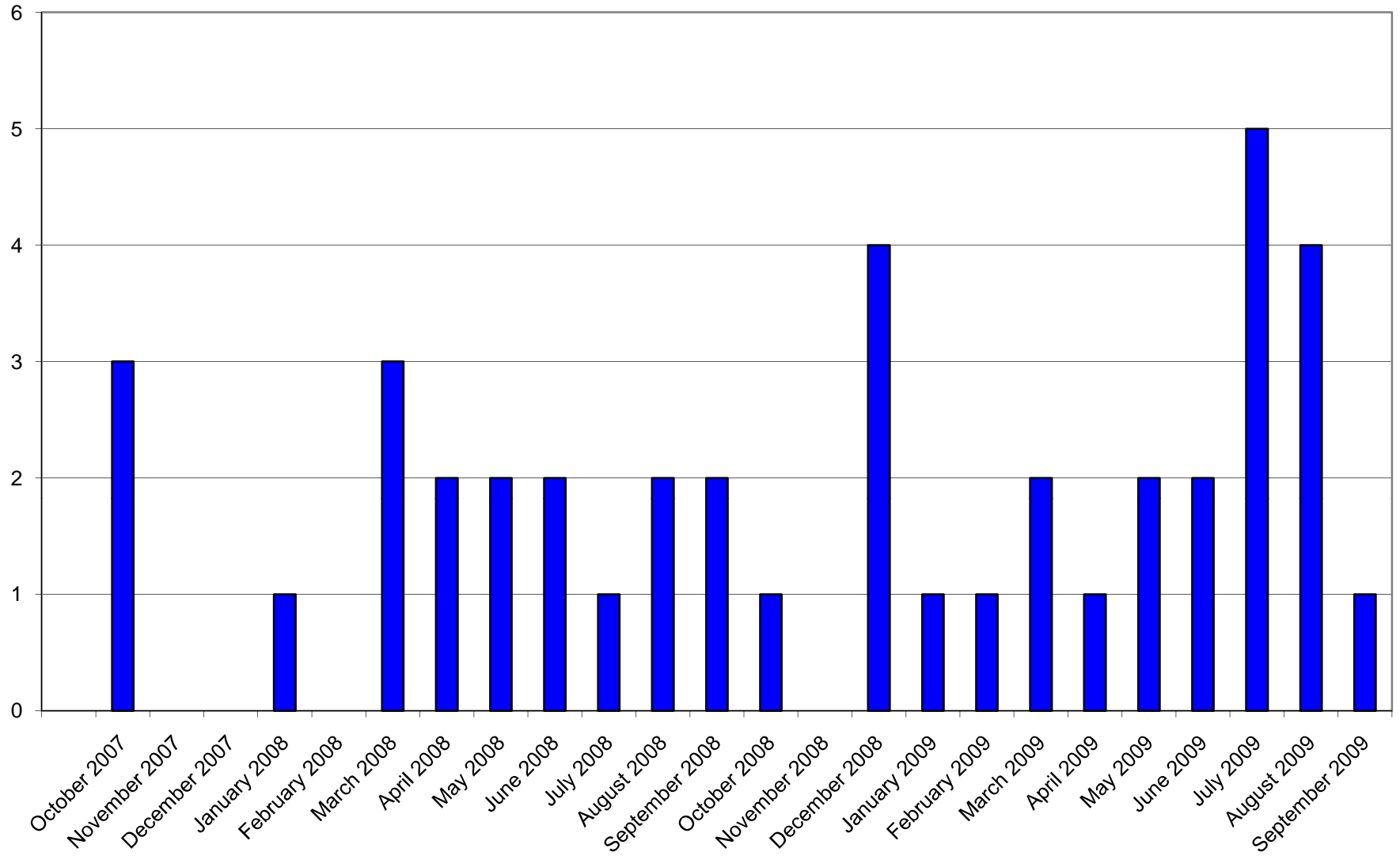
**Christian Community** - Scott Wieking applauds the city for organizing Davis Neighbors Night Out. He announced the Hope Walks event to help Aids orphans in India which will take place in Arroyo Park on Sunday, October 18 at 2:00 p.m.

Scott reported that their pastoral group had Lt. Waltz out to speak about workplace violence and safety in the church. He highly recommends the presentation which lasts 45 - 60 minutes. It answered the questions they had, especially regarding active shooter.

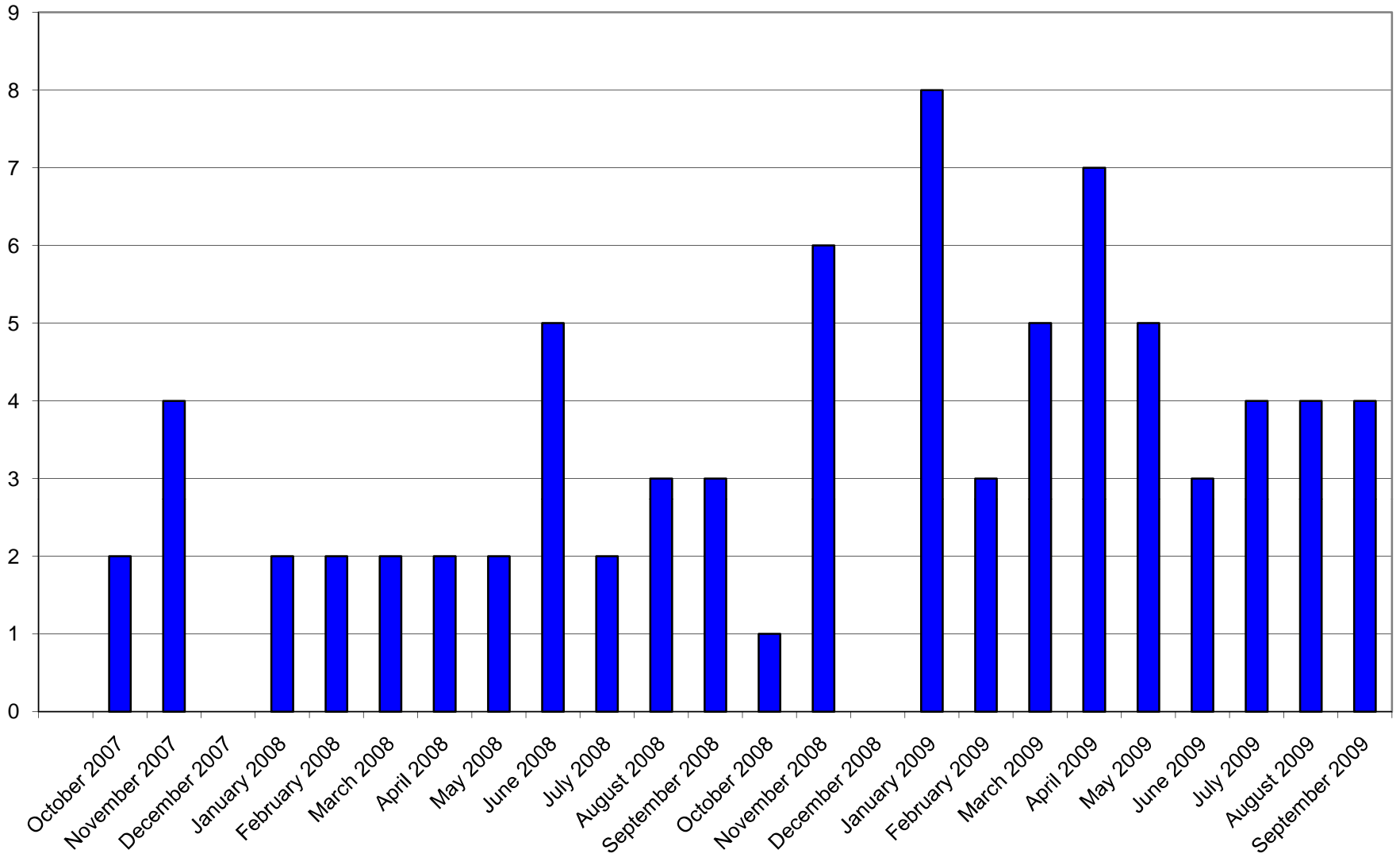
**Youth Apprenticeships** - Mel Lewis is hoping to find apprenticeships for students of color who are without jobs and opportunities. Chief Black recommended talking with service groups such as the Rotary to see what the business community can do.

Captain Pytel said that there are more youth in the community who need intervention than the probations department can handle. DPD is working on a plan to assign some to patrol officers to work together with them and their parents about choices. He also mentioned there is some gang intimidation going on.

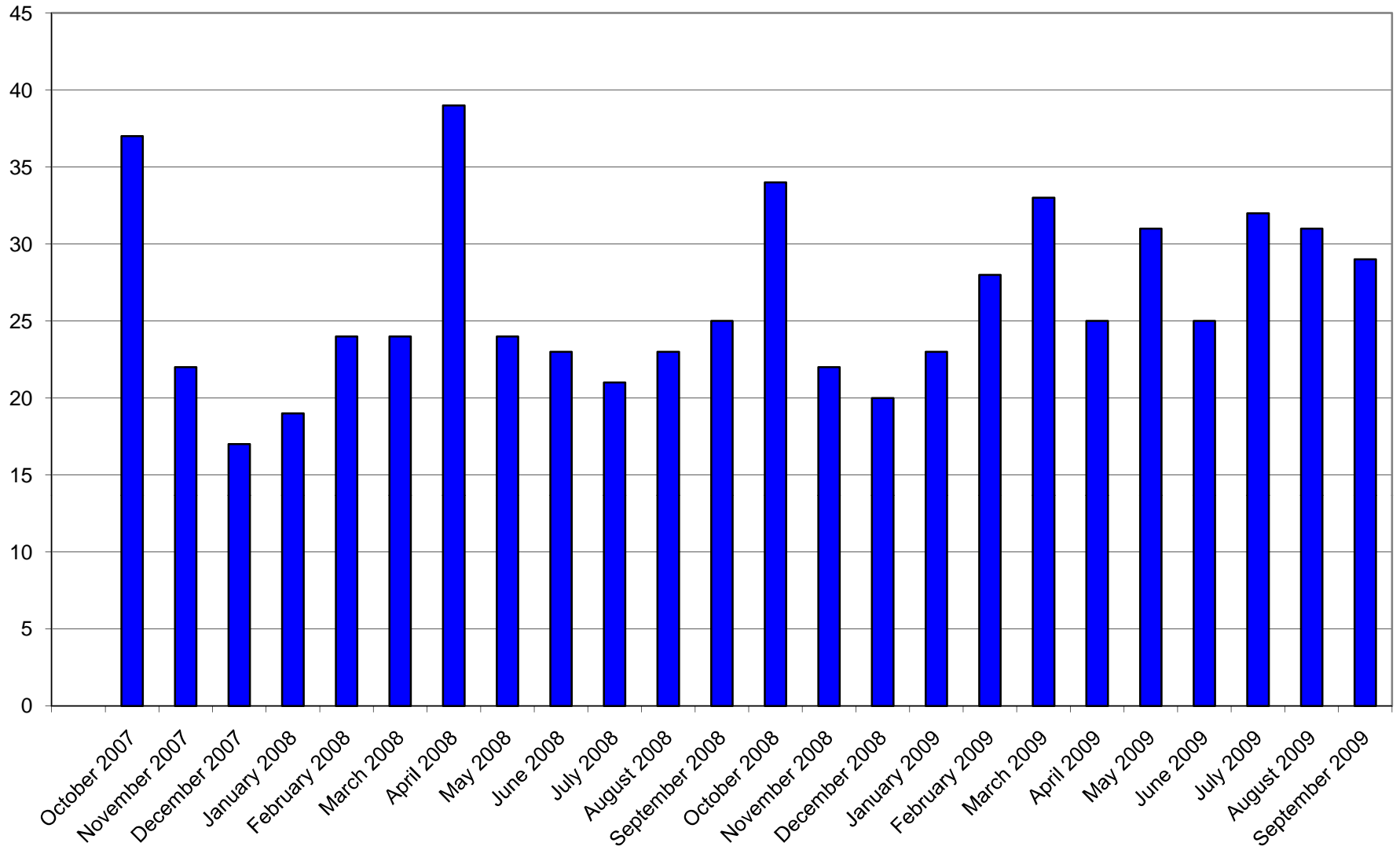
