

HAZARDOUS WASTE

Electronics

Electronics such as television and computer monitors cannot be put in the trash. The Yolo County Central Landfill will accept these items at no charge. Accepted items include: television and computer monitors, cellular phones, fax machines, printers, stereos, keyboards, vacuum cleaners, toasters, typewriters, VCR's, CPU's, microwaves and more. There is a fee for appliances.



Batteries

Residents can recycle alkaline, lithium and rechargeable batteries for free at these collection sites in Davis:

- * Longs Drug Stores, 1550 E. Covell Blvd. and 1471 W. Covell Blvd.
- * Rite Aid, 655 Russell Blvd., and 2135 Cowell Blvd.
- * Davis Ace Hardware at 3rd & G Sts.
- * Davis Senior Center, 646 A St.
- * Hibbert Lumber, 500 G St.

Please sort all batteries by type (alkaline, lithium and rechargeable) into SEPARATE plastic bags BEFORE bringing them to be recycled.

DOES YOUR BUSINESS GENERATE HAZARDOUS WASTE?

Federal and State laws require all businesses and industries who generate, store or accumulate hazardous waste to comply with regulations for proper treatment, storage and disposal of these wastes. One such way is through participation in a Conditionally Exempt Small Quantity Generator (CESQG) program.

Your business may be applicable as a CESQG if it generates per month:

- Less than 220 pounds of most hazardous materials (i.e. paints, solvents)
- Less than 2.2 pounds of acutely hazardous chemicals (i.e., mercury)
- Less than 110 pounds of perchloroethylene

If your business generates more per month than the amounts of waste listed above, you are considered a regulated generator and you MAY NOT participate in the CESQG event. For information on how to dispose of your hazardous waste, call a local hazardous waste management company, or the State Department of Toxic Substances Control at (916) 255-3545.

Other disposal options:

Pre-paid mailer programs: You can purchase collection boxes to collect fluorescent tubes/bulbs/balast or batteries. The boxes are sold at a fixed price, which includes shipping and disposal costs. Once you fill the box with batteries or fluorescents, they are mailed off to a recycler. To find a pre-paid mailer program, type "recycle fluorescent lamps" or "recycle batteries" in your internet search bar.

Rechargeable Battery Recycling Corporation (RBRC): Rechargeable batteries can be recycled for free through the RBRC. Request a free collection box for rechargeable batteries online at www.call2recycle.com.
