

Davis Police Department Stop Data 2019

Background

The Racial and Identity Profiling Act (RIPA) was formed, pursuant to Assembly Bill (AB) 953, to assist in the elimination of racial and identity profiling in law enforcement. To help achieve this goal, the RIPA Board developed a stop-data collection process that took effect in July 2018 for the eight largest agencies in California¹. While agencies the size of Davis PD are not required to submit data until April 2023, we have embarked upon this effort four years earlier than required. To date, Davis PD remains one of the few agencies of its size to collect stop data in California.

Overall, the first-year data has helped our agency identify and clarify reporting errors, system glitches and methodology. Davis PD is poised to electronically submit 2020 stop data to DOJ next calendar year.

Quick Stats

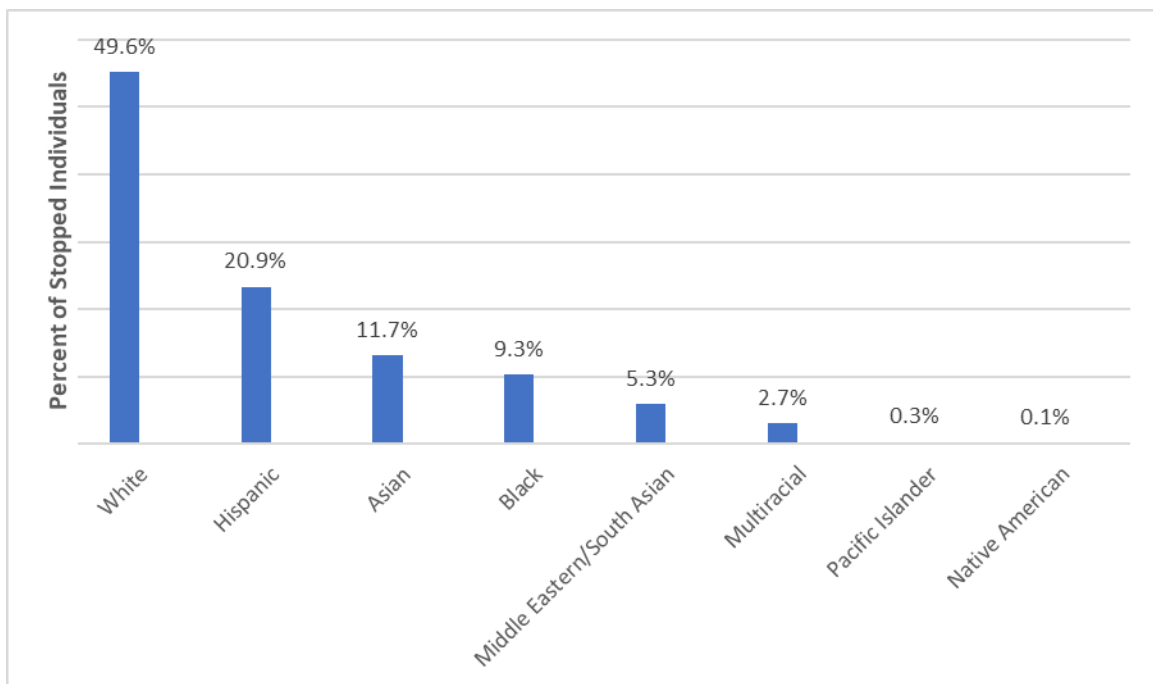
- Number of stops with RIPA data: (N=5,561)
- 86% were officer initiated
- 71% of RIPA stops were conducted due to a traffic violation
- 20% of RIPA stops were conducted due to suspicion of criminal activity
- Of the RIPA stops (see Chart 1):
 - 12% were perceived as Asian
 - 9% were perceived as Black
 - 21% were perceived as Hispanic/Latino
 - 5% were perceived as Middle Eastern or South Asian
 - 50% were perceived as White

Specific Data Sets

Charts 1/2: Ethnicity

Persons perceived to be White (49.6%), Hispanic (20.9%) and Asian (11.7%) comprised the majority of stopped individuals in this reporting period. This finding varied from the RIPA Board's 2020 report in which their data found the majority to be Hispanic (39.8%), White (33.2%) and Black (15.2%)².

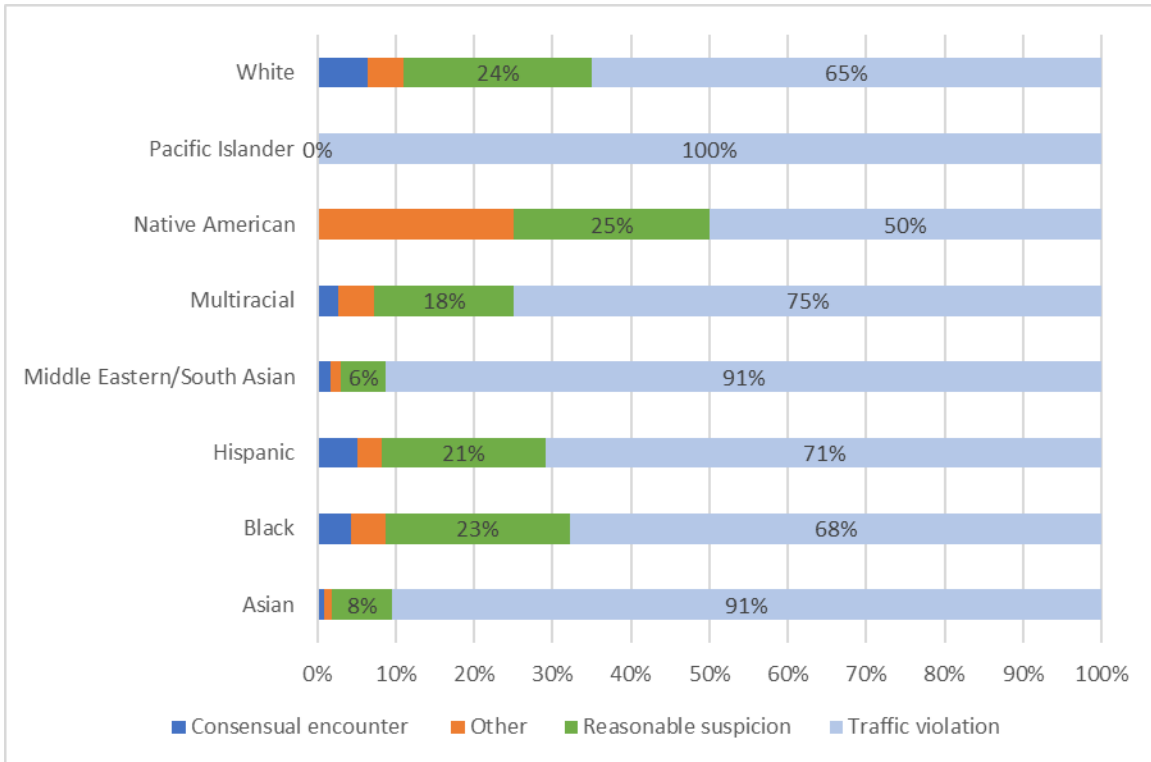

Charts 3/4: Ethnicity & Reason for Stop

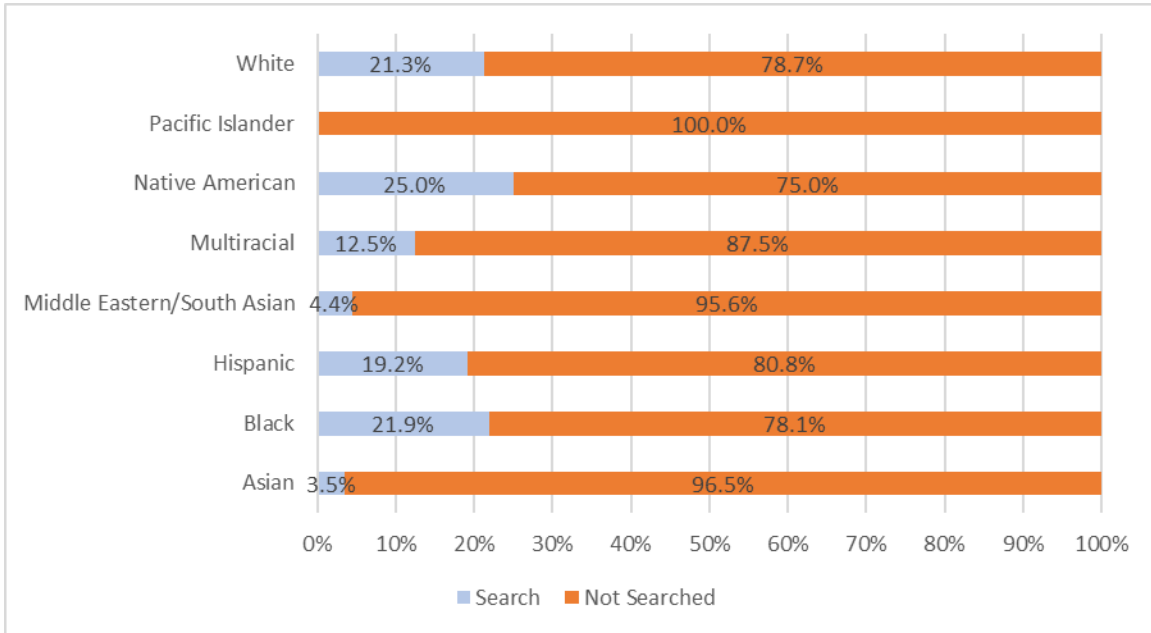
The most commonly reported reason for a stop across all racial/ethnic groups was traffic violations (71%), followed by reasonable suspicion (20%). This finding is consistent with the findings released in the RIPA Board’s 2020 report. The findings also showed that a higher percentage of Native American (25%), White (24%) and Black (23%) individuals were stopped for reasonable suspicion than other racial identity groups.

Charts 5/6: Ethnicity & Search Outcomes

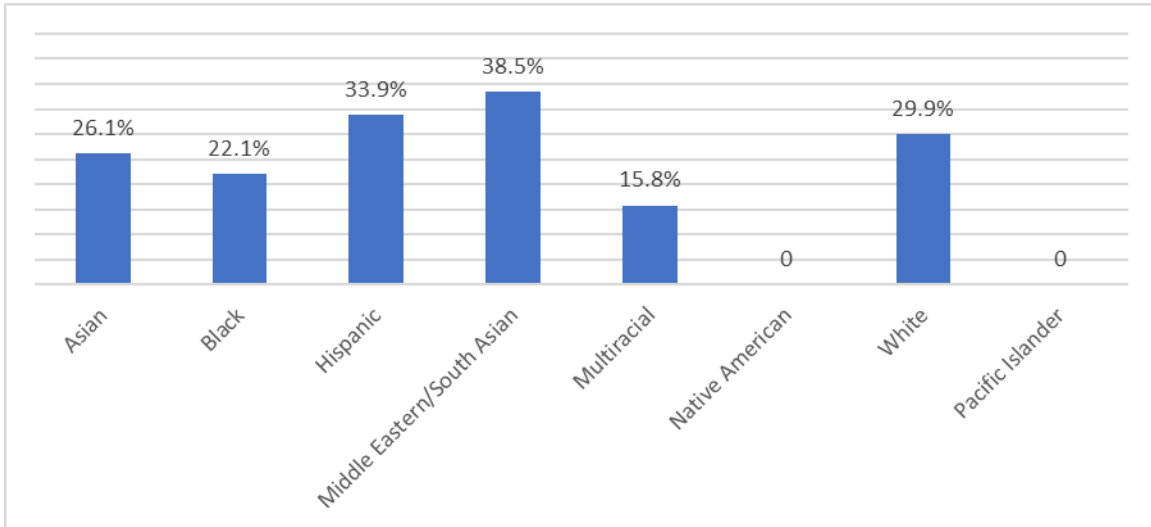
Overall, 18% of stopped individuals were subject to a person, vehicle, or other property search. The data shows that Native Americans had the highest search rate (25%), although the overall number of stops was low (N=8). The data also shows that White (21.3%) and Black (21.9%) individuals are searched at a rate 6 times higher than Asians (3.5%).

Charts 7/8: Ethnicity & Search Yield Rates

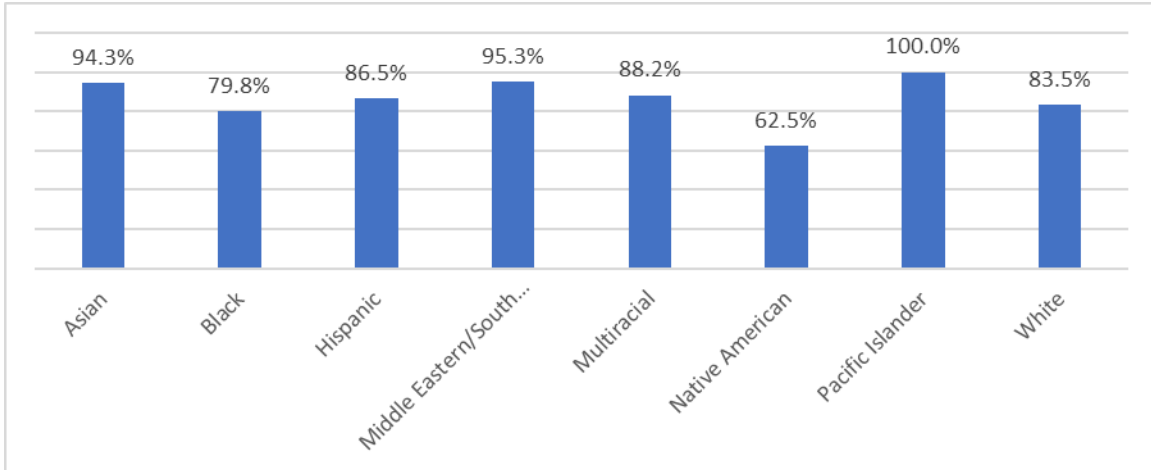
Search yield rate analyses demonstrate that of the stops involving a search, 30% (N=291) result in the location of contraband/evidence. Further, the data shows that search yield rates (locating evidence/contraband subsequent to a search) was highest for Middle Eastern/South Asian (38.5%) and lowest for Native Americans (0). Hispanic individuals appear to have higher search yield rates than Whites (29.9%), Asians (26.1%) and Blacks (22.1%).

Charts 9/10: Ethnicity & Source of Call

Overall, the data shows that 86% of all stops meeting the RIPA data criteria were officer initiated. Of these stops, a higher percentage of Pacific Islander (100%) and Middle Eastern/South Asian (95.3%) individuals were stopped at the discretion of the officer (“officer initiated”). Conversely, a much lower percentage of Black (79.8%) and Native American (62.5%) individuals were stopped at the discretion of the officer.

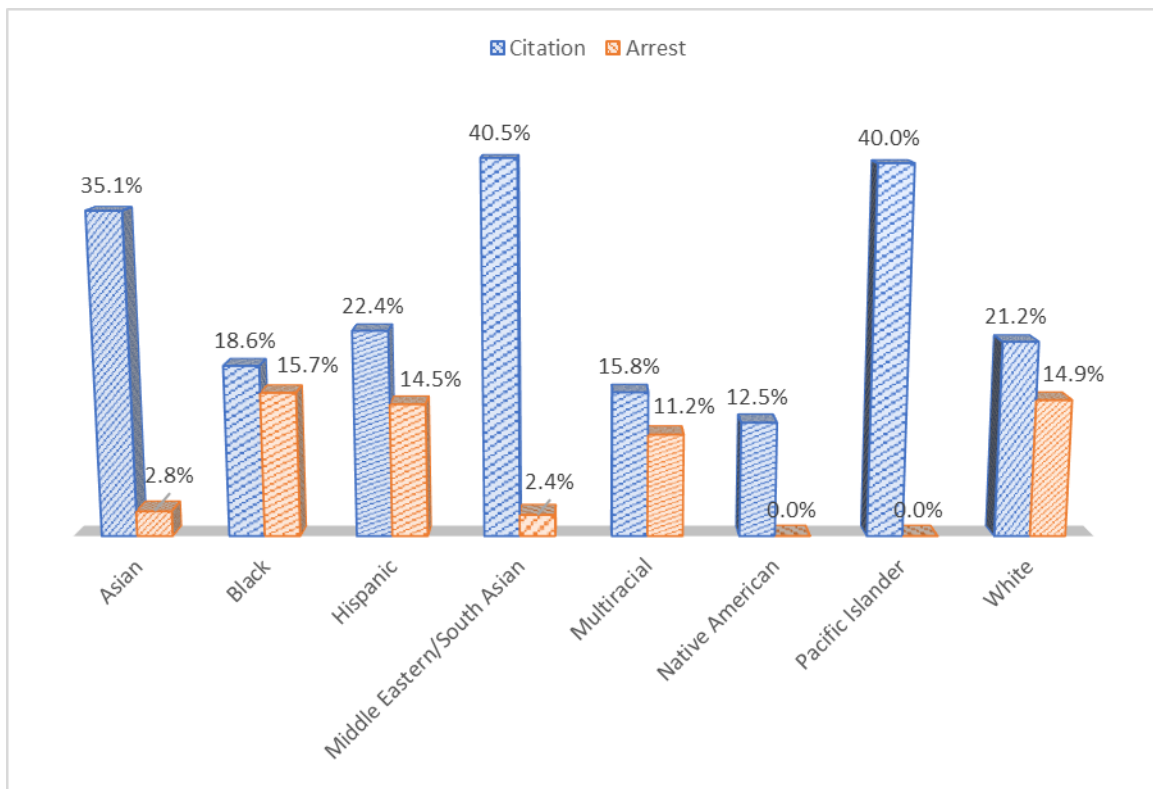

Charts 11/12: Ethnicity & Arrest/Citation Outcomes

The data shows that of the stops meeting RIPA criteria, 36% (N=2,026) of the individuals stopped were either cited or arrested. This finding deviates significantly from the RIPA Board 2020 report which found that the contributing agencies had arrested or cited over 60% of individuals stopped.

Arrests in this data set include the following: outstanding warrant arrests, “fresh” arrests and detentions (PC 849.5). In some cases, outside agency arrests are also included. Please see the accompanying arrest report for the actual number of fresh arrests. As demonstrated by the chart below, warrants account for anywhere between 11% to 53% of total arrests across ethnic groups.
