CAAP Project Framework

- 1. Community Outreach: stakeholders and community participants are offered a range of opportunities to give CAAP input, including community workshops, online surveys, pop-ups at community events, a CAAP-dedicated webpage and email contact, and a listserve to receive up-to-date information. Community partners such as Cool Davis receive regular updates on CAAP progress.
- **2. City Team**: This includes the city staff project management team, an interdepartmental Internal Staff Team with every department represented, the consultant, City Council and Commissions.
- **3. Technical Advisory Committee**: This includes local and university technical experts representing significant areas of expertise and knowledge related to CAAP development to support the city team.








CAAP Draft Timeline

Highlights of Vulnerability Assessment Results

- In Yolo County top health issues of concern include obesity, heart disease, and diabetes
- Health or socioeconomic issues are correlated to increased sensitivity to climate hazards
- Climate stressors such as extreme heat and wildfire can exacerbate health issues
- Outdoor workers, people who bike/walk or take transit may be more exposed to extreme heat and poor air quality






