**SUBJECT:** Transition to District Elections – Public Hearing #3 Draft Maps

#### **Recommendation**

1. Receive a presentation from staff and the demographer on draft district maps.

- 2. Hold public hearing to receive public comment regarding the draft City Council voting district boundaries and the sequencing of elections.
- 3. Provide direction to staff and the demographer on preferred map(s), proposed revisions to the draft maps, or requests for additional map options. The revised maps and/or additional map options will be considered by City Council at public hearing #4 on October 22, 2019 when City Council must make the final map selection and introduce an ordinance with the district boundaries and election sequencing.
- 4. Provide direction to staff on the sequencing of the elections for districts (2020 and 2022) within map options, including whether City Council is interested in having more than one sequencing option for each proposed map. City Council must make the final selection related to the sequencing of elections that accompanies the final district boundaries map chosen on October 22, 2019.

### **Fiscal Impact**

By transitioning voluntarily to districts, the City is not exposed to potentially high costs of litigation. The costs to transition to district-based elections include the costs of the demographer (approximately \$35,000), to be paid out of the existing budget, and staff time to complete the process, which is also included as part of the existing budget. Additionally, the City will be required by law to pay up to \$30,000 in attorney fees to Rexroad Law.

Should the City Council choose to move from a 5-member City Council to a 7-district system, there would be additional costs to add two council members. The direct cost increase is estimated to total approximately \$100,000 per year, although this may vary based on individual council members. Costs include Council salaries, benefits, stipend and travel, equipment and other operational charges specific to the City Council. Indirect costs are unknown at this time but would include staff time spent for and with two additional councilmembers. If the Council chooses to consider more than five districts, staff will return at a later date with information about additional fiscal impacts and organizational considerations related to an increase in the number of districts.

#### **Council Goal(s)**

The transition to district elections does not pertain to a specific Council Goal, however, it falls under the Goal to secure a safe, healthy, equitable community.

### **Background and Analysis**

The City of Davis is in the process of transitioning to city council voting districts, a process laid out by the California Voting Rights Act (CVRA). This is the third in a series of five public hearings on the transition; this public hearing focuses on input, discussion and direction on the draft maps and on the proposed sequencing of the voting for each district proposed within each of the five maps. In order to reach this stage of draft maps, the City, working with demographer Paul Mitchell of Redistricting Partners, has asked the community for input through a variety of mechanisms. These include requests for people to complete "Communities of Interest" forms, either online or on paper; holding a community workshop to allow participants to learn about the process and try their hand at drawing maps; receiving public testimony at two public hearings held on September 3 and 10; and providing information about the process at the Davis Farmers Market. Redistricting Partners has taken all of the input, along with 2010 census population data and other information, and has provided five (5) separate draft maps for consideration, three 5-district maps and two 7-district maps.

Each map has data included with it to show the 2010 population count within the District, as each District is required to have approximately equal population. The data also include the percentages of other demographic groups, such as racial/ethnic minorities, or communities of interest, such as renters.

Redistricting Partners will provide additional information at the City Council meeting to detail the considerations used in developing the attached draft maps.

In addition to the actual draft maps, staff has included proposed sequencing for each map.

- For the 5-district maps, staff proposes that the districts where the most recently elected councilmembers (Carson, Partida) reside come up for election in 2022, at the same time as the two council seats previously elected at large would otherwise be up for election. The remaining three districts would all come up for election in 2020.
- Sequencing on the 7-district elections is slightly more complicated. Again, the two districts where the most recently elected council members reside would be recommended for the 2022 election, as that coincides with the end of their terms. However, a total of five districts would need to be elected in 2020 in order to become a 7-member City Council. Staff proposes that four of these be for four-year terms and one district be for an initial two-year term, with another election, for a four-year term, in 2022. This results in ongoing Council elections of four districts in one year and three districts at the next election.

The City Council has the opportunity at this public hearing to provide direction to the demographer and/or to staff on any desired changes to the maps or the proposed sequencing. City Council may also request additional map options for consideration at the next public hearing. These map options will be made available to the public on October 15, 2019. The City Council will need to choose and approve one map and accompanying sequencing of elections at the next meeting, on October 22, and introduce an ordinance to adopt the preferred map






# Davis Five-District Option #1




