PART THREE: Scope of Proposal
a. Need/Target Group (Describe the need for the activity and the group being served)  This project identifies multiple park facilities in need of accessibility installations and upgrades for individuals and groups with limited mobility.

## b. Project Description/Benefit (Activity Summary: Describe the activities of the proposed budget and benefit)

The proposed project addresses the need for repairs to numerous ADA ramps in City park play areas and/or outdoor exercise areas that have begun to fail over the years, (ramps have recessed because the subsurface structure was never installed) and to add ADA ramps that are non-existent into play and exercise areas that currently do not provide them.

Research shows that seniors and people with disabilities are at a greater risk of chronic health conditions compared to people without disabilities. Furthermore, individuals with disabilities experience greater difficulty participating in physical activities due to accessibility issues. These findings, coupled with the fact that an estimated 4,202 Davis residents (approximately 6.3% of the City's population) have a mobility or self-care limitation, demonstrate the need for public amenities that offer accessible fitness and recreational opportunities.

The benefits of accessible play and outdoor exercise equipment are many. First, this project expands fitness and recreational opportunities to groups with mobility challenges and disabilities. Secondly, this improved access to play and fitness equipment promotes physical activity among a population that often faces many barriers when participating in fitness-based programming. Additionally, the project encourages a more fully integrated connection with the community and fosters an overall sense of camaraderie among participants.

Finally, the cost per beneficiary is extremely low compared to other fitness-related facilities such as gyms, which generally charge a monthly membership fee. The project also directly aligns with the non-public services critical need to remove architectural barriers with emphasis on widely-used public facilities.

c. <u>Outreach</u> (Describe the outreach your organization will provide for the CDBG-funded project, as well as provide a list of the languages currently included in your organizational outreach)

Since the beginning of COVID, the Parks and Community Services (PCS) has a very engaged and robust outreach process and uses a number of methods to inform and educate the community on park projects. The outreach includes but not limited to: postcards to residents, signage at the parks with a QR code that is linked to the PCS capital improvements page with a timeline of the improvements, Next Door Neighbor and Facebook posts, press release and announcements made at Recreation & Park Commission meetings.

d. Organizational Capacity (Summarize your organizational capacity for the proposed project)

The City of Davis boasts an extensive history in the completion of projects of this nature. Over the past six years, the City has replaced more than 25 playgrounds and exercise equipment. Of said projects, 20 of the sites needed ADA ramp installations, or repairs to existing ADA ramps, as part of the project. All of the playground/equipment renovations over during this period included robust community outreach. These projects demonstrate the Department's commitment and expertise in engaging the community for input and integrating that input into improved recreational opportunities.

Since COVID, especially due to social distancing, parks have remained one of the only venues where people can safely recreate. This uptake in use requires that the City address any and all barriers to access to its users to ensure that all residents are able to enjoy the all of the City's facilities, including play areas and outdoor exercise equipment.
