SUBJECT: ARPA Update

Recommendation

1. Receive update on funds provided from the American Rescue Plan Act (ARP)

- 2. Authorize City Manager to amend the current contract with Mercer Veterinary Clinic/DPAW to provide funding for \$12,000 per year for three years totaling \$36,000. (The first year has already been approved and partially allocated.)
- Appoint a Council Subcommittee to work with staff to develop process for funds currently unallocated. Direct Subcommittee to return to Council with proposal for fund allocation.

Fiscal Impact

The City of Davis has already received \$19,730,600 in funding from the American Rescue Plan Act. This report is an update and has no additional fiscal impact.

Council Goal(s)

Commission Input

The City Council previously had a Council Subcommittee of Lucas Frerichs and Will Arnold. The Subcommittee worked with staff to bring funding recommendations directly to the City Council.

Background and Analysis

The American Rescue Plan (ARP) is a federal stimulus plan to provide funding to State and local governments to assist communities in recovering from the COVID-19 pandemic. Davis' share is \$19.7 million. These funds are intended to assist communities recover from Davis and must be spent by December 2024 (or for certain projects, like construction projects, encumbered by 2024 and spent by December 2026).

The City Council has discussed the ARP funds on multiple dates, with the most recent being March 1, 2022. That staff report (which also links to previous staff reports) can be found here. Between September of 2021 and the March 1, 2022 meeting, the Council provided direction on spending the funding. The projects are shown in the chart below and include a brief status update. Work has begun on many of the projects and staff has started to allocate the funding to outside organizations, as agreements are completed.

Mercer Veterinary Clinic/Davis Pet Advocacy and Wellness (DPAW)

One of the recommendations in this report is for the Council to authorize the City Manager to amend the agreement with Mercer Clinic/DPAW to provide three years' worth of funding for the organization, which protects community health by ensuring that pets of homeless individuals are up to date on vaccinations and general health care. When staff was working with the organization on their agreement for the funds, there was a difference in understanding of the Council's intent for funding approval. The agreement was crafted for a one-year, \$12,000 contribution; the request was for a three-year, \$36,000 contribution. If Council concurs, this amendment is within City Manager authority to complete and would come from the previously allocated \$1.6 million for homelessness services.

Unallocated Amounts

Of the original \$19.7 million, The City Council placed approximately \$1.6 million in reserve to be allocated. Council also designated \$385,600 in reserve for future COVID response needs. In addition, of the \$1.5 allocated for Healthy Davis Together testing, approximately \$430,000 remains. This brings the total amount available for Council to consider for allocation (or reallocation) to \$2,462,000.

Staff recommends that Council appoint a Council Subcommittee to work with staff to develop a process to allocate the remainder and return to Council with recommendations as soon as practical.

As noted above, these funds have a fairly short spending window. Funds are required to be spent, or in some cases, fully encumbered, by the end of calendar year 2024. Because of the relatively short time frame to spend the funds, the City Manager has made reassignments at the staff level to ensure adequate attention and monitoring on the different allocations and subgrants. Staff expects that, between the additional staff hours and future Council guidance on the currently unallocated funds, the City will be able to fully allocate and expend the funds within the necessary time frame.
