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PART THREE: Scope of Proposal

a. Need/Target Group (Describe the need for the activity and the group being served)

Empower Yolo offers a crisis shelter that houses self-identified victims of domestic violence, sexual assault, stalking and trafficking and their children. Many of our shelter residents arrive immediately after an abusive incident and others are referred by service providers, law enforcement, child welfare services, family or friends. In 2018, Empower Yolo began providing emergency shelter to adult male victims as well as women and children. Unfortunately, domestic violence rarely has one victim and children are at a significantly higher risk of injury because of their close proximity to their non-offending parent during a violent incident. Repeated exposure to trauma and violence can disrupt brain development and increase the risk of serious illness, psychological issues, and dangerous behavior later in life. Our program offers age appropriate support and counseling services to every child in our shelter.

When survivors of domestic violence seek to escape their abusive homes they are not only faced with the challenge of finding shelter for themselves and their children, but also for their pets. In the past, Empower Yolo has only allowed service animals in the shelter. In 2019, our shelter became pet friendly.

We are able to leverage local, foundation and private funding as match funding for federal programs in order to provide comprehensive support to victims. Our CDBG funding is used to provide support services and housing navigation to Davis residents while they stay in our shelter and beyond.

b. <u>Project Description/Benefit</u> (Activity Summary: Describe the activities of the proposed budget and benefit)

Our shelter program operates on three core principles, to: 1) Create safety, 2) Enhance well-being. 3) Provide stability. More than just a temporary refuge, our confidentially located safe house provides a comprehensive empowerment program designed to assist survivors in becoming more independent, empowered, and safe from the violence in their lives. Although domestic violence can happen to anyone, the correlation between poverty and violence against women is undeniable. Domestic violence can interfere with education, training and work; it can cause dependence on welfare, or prevent a successful welfare-to-work transition. In fact, economic self-sufficiency is often the single most important factor in determining a woman's ability to escape abuse. Although men can be victims of domestic violence, and we do shelter and serve them, our shelter clients are predominately women. Our housing counseling services include housing navigation, financial literacy, resource development and opportunities to participate in our Rapid Rehousing program or our Housing First Transitional Housing program.

Effective interventions for children and adolescents cannot be separated from the responses to the non-offending parent. The welfare of children is strongly linked to their non-offending parent's safety and emotional well-being.

c. <u>Outreach</u> (Describe the outreach your organization will provide for the CDBG-funded project, as well as provide a list of the languages currently included in your organizational outreach)

Outreach efforts for the shelter includes the distribution of brochures and posters throughout the community; social media, zoom presentations and eblasts. We also have a walk-in center located on the corner of 5th and D Street in Davis. Individuals needing a domestic violence shelter or other services can walk-in and complete a shelter screening or receive other services at that site during normal business hours. Empower Yolo also offers 24-hour crisis line support, information and referrals.

Empower Yolo has staff members who speak Spanish, Mandarin, Urdu, Punjabi, and Hindi.

d. <u>Organizational Capacity</u> (Summarize your organizational capacity for the proposed project)

Empower Yolo is one of Yolo County's oldest and well-established non-profit organizations, now in our 45th year. We are still known to many individuals as the Sexual Assault and Domestic Violence Center. Originally established in a small apartment in Davis, today the agency has grown to provide extensive services throughout Yolo County. With offices in Davis, West Sacramento, Woodland, and Knights Landing. Our shelter director has been with our agency for nearly 20 years and our growing staff also includes volunteers who assist with answering the crisis line, organizing our community clothing closet, helping support our child advocates and other tasks.

e. <u>Partnerships and Other Resources</u> (List other agencies you collaborate with and indicate whether or not your proposed project is duplicative of other projects operated by local public or non-profit organizations)

Empower Yolo is the only agency in Yolo County that provides comprehensive services to victims of domestic violence, sexual assault, stalking and trafficking. Community partners that help support all of our services include the Yolo County Health and Human Services Agency, Child Support Services; First 5 Yolo; Dignity Health; UC Davis Family Protection and Legal Assistance Clinic; the Crisis Nursery, YCCC, Davis Community Meals, 4th and Hope, Legal Services of Northern California, Communicare, Shores of Hope and local law enforcement agencies.

These partnerships create an improved coordinated response to all survivors of family violence by co-locating and/or coordinating existing county services so survivors can more effectively navigate through multiple systems when they have limited windows of time and multiple urgent needs.
