# Safe Disposal Information for Sharps and Medications

### Why is proper sharps disposal important?

"Sharps" refers to hypodermic needles, pen needles, intravenous needles, lancets and other similar devices. When used sharps are not disposed of safely, they may cause injury.


Never place sharps in a trash or recycling container and never flush sharps down the toilet. Not only is it illegal to dispose of used sharps in this way, it also puts trash and sewage workers, custodial or janitorial staff and household members at risk of being harmed.

#### **Safe Sharps Disposal**

Place used sharps in a red sharps container or a puncture-proof container (example: a detergent bottle or coffee can), tightly close and tape the lid shut, then write "Sharps Waste" on the outside of the container. You can take the filled container to these locations for safe disposal during the hours listed below:

### Why is proper medication disposal important?

Proper disposal of medications at pharmaceutical dropoff locations is important for public health and safety and for environmental protection.

- Placing medication in the trash is not safe and contaminates water. Medications disposed of in the trash are not secure and can be accessed by almost anyone, especially when placed at the curb. Once at the landfill, the medications can end up in the landfill leachate— the water that infiltrates and percolates through the garbage placed in landfills. Once it enters this water, it cannot be removed.
- Flushing medications contaminates water. Flushing medications down the toilet or pouring medications down a drain can directly pollute local water sources, since wastewater treatment plants cannot remove medications from the water.
- Storing medications can be unsafe. Leftover
  medications stored in unlocked cabinets are accessible
  by children or others in the household, increasing the risk
  of preventable poisonings, drug abuse and overdoses.
